LOCAL RECYCLING MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR?

Local Recycling

Mr Culverwell and Mrs Harper took Year Six to debate recycling in the BOROUGH with the Mayor.

The highlights have been summarised by Jamie Quantick In this area various things can be collected with your rubbish and be recycled. These include paper, glass, metal, plastic and food waste. Some things can't be recycled such as specialist phones and some metals, so it's best to take these straight to the dump. General left over waste that can't be recycled gets put in an incinerator and burnt, or buried in the ground, but neither of these is very good for the environment, so it's better to reuse or recycle where you can.

Paper is collected every week with your bins and is taken to a paper mill at Earlswood. It's then reduced to a pulp with the ink being extracted by rollers. More paper is then made.

Glass gets collected every other week and is taken to a glass factory in Earlswood. Here they melt the glass down and then reuse it. Melting the glass down takes less energy than making it in the first place, so it's more energy efficient and environmentally friendly to recycle than to make it new.

Plastic items go from your home to a factory where they are recycled.

Anything else from your mixed recycling bin goes on a conveyor belt and people who work at the Recycling Centre take anything else off that can be saved for reuse.

Other items such as clothes can be recycled by using the collection points which tend to be at places like supermarkets and rows of shops.

Lots of people feel that items aren't actually being recycled, but the Mayor of Reigate and Banstead wants to assure everybody that the Borough does properly recycle the items it says it does.

As well as being good for the environment recycling has also created jobs so it is good for local employment.
